Today's teen girls are experiencing record high levels of violence, sadness, and mental health challenges, and support. According to a 2023 CDC study, 53 percent of teenage girls reported extreme depressive symptoms in 2023. In the same study, 28 percent of teenage boys felt persistent sadness.

Ophelia's Place strives to help build a better, safer, and more equitable community for girls and youth to grow up and thrive in. Its robust, community-centered offerings focus on building youth and community allies. Many of OP's direct services are available for free or on a sliding-fee scale regardless of income level. This couldn't be possible without individual gifts, corporate sponsorship, grants, and foundation dollars. The Gala is one of those important income sources.

"It doesn't have to be scary to be a girl," said Ophelia's place Executive Director Laura Sanchez. "At Ophelia's Place, girl-identified youth have a safe space to connect, feel supported, and honor their individuality, no matter how spine-chilling things might feel."
